David Trotter is a renowned shipwreck discoverer, deep diver, author, lecturer and photographer. In over 20 years of diving, he has been the first to locate, identify and document 80+ Great Lakes shipwrecks. His shipwreck discoveries and programs have been featured on television and in newspapers throughout the U.S. and Canada. He has written several articles on Great Lakes shipwrecks that have been published in historical journals and national scuba diving publications.

Through his organization, **Undersea Research Associates**, founded to present the Great Lakes community with an electronically sophisticated means of underwater search and survey for archeological and commercial purposes, he presents visual underwater time capsules of marine history. Utilizing state-of-the-art side scan sonar, with outstanding skilled operators, the organization offers high resolution bottom profiling at depths to 1,000 feet, underwater site survey and underwater photographic documentation.

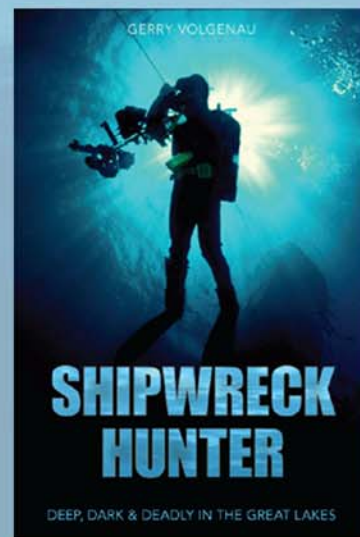

The Steamship Metropole

On August 8, 1903, the 118' *Metropole* met her third and final disaster as the steamer slide beneath the surface, to become a part of Lake Huron's "Shipwreck Alley". Nearly a 100 years later, a team of explorers discover a most unique



time capsule.....the intact *SS Metropole* with her masts, wooden pilot house, giant steering wheel, compass, anchors, and cargo still in place. She appears ready to continue her voyage with crews initials still visibly carved in planking, fire hoses ready for deployment, shovels hanging from hooks and the compass still functioning. We are transported into a working steamer of the 19th century. Share the adventure with us.....it doesn't get any better than this!



Shattered Dreams: The Hunter Savidge Story

At 4:00 P.M. on August 20, 1899, a whirlwind squall stuck suddenly without warning, and the *Hunter Savidge* was spun around and capsized in ten terrifying seconds. Captain Sharpsteen's wife, Rose, and Mrs. Mullerweiss and Etta, wife and daughter of the owner, were trapped in the cabin. John, the Captain's son, disappeared beneath the surface. It has been said by old-time seamen that the *Hunter Savidge* still waits to gather all those who shared her tragic past, and with a full crew and passengers, would then finally rest quietly in the depths of Lake Huron. Her discovery and exploration is a mystery solved, and solved only by the most unusual events. Learn the secrets of the Hunter Savidge as she is explored 85 years after her disappearance!



Two Ships....Frozen In Time

The 163' Barquentine *H. P. Bridge*, built in 1863 during the Civil War, was only four years old when fate was to harshly intervene on May 11, 1869. Struck amidships by the Steamer *Colorado*, the Bridge disappeared. 135 years later, what the expedition team discovered amazed everyone....the ship appeared to be suspended in time. All masts upright, and unique



features so pristine that the explorers felt they were in a time capsule! The 328' Steamer *W. C. Gilbert*, lost in the brutal collision with the Steamer *Caldera* in 1914, disappeared beneath the surface in less than 5 minutes. Due to the heroic efforts of her Captain, the crew survived. Now two ships, generations apart in design, size, & construction, rest quietly just a few miles apart, in the cold, deep waters of Lake Huron. It is an exciting tale of adventure and discovery of ships that are "Frozen in Time."
